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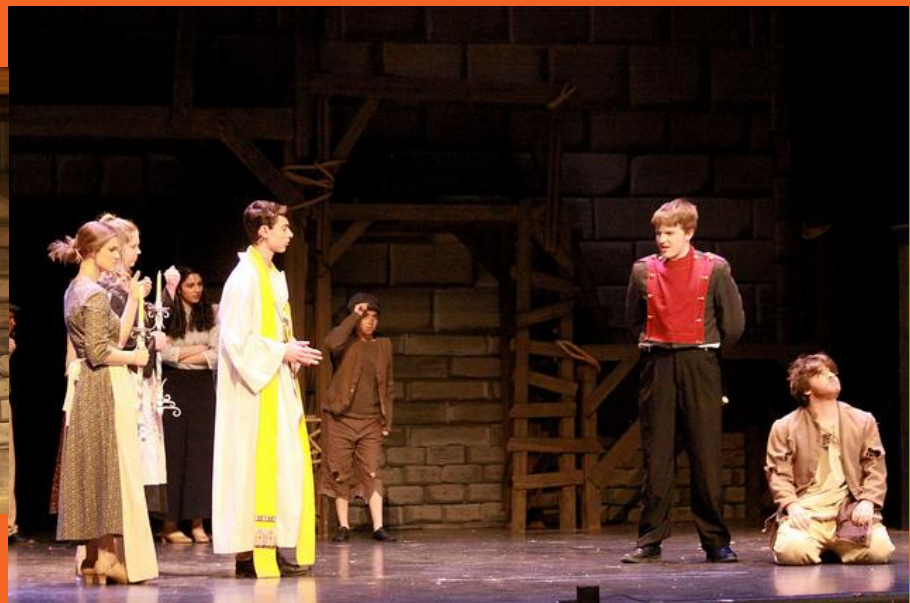

# Office of the Principal

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This is the final Principal's Newsletter that I am writing as Principal of St. Charles East High School. Having the opportunity to lead one of the best high schools in the state and nation has been the best seven years of my professional career. The parents, teachers, administration, and support staff have been incredible and continue to impress me as I am winding down the last month of school.

Last Thursday, May 17, a group of teachers, students, parents and administrators interviewed and picked the next Principal of St. Charles East High School, James Richter. Mr. Richter has been a science teacher, Lead Teacher and is currently the Assistant Principal for Instructional Programs at STCE. The STCE Principal's Selection Committee's recommendation will be voted on by the D303 School Board on Monday, June 11. I am so excited for Mr. Richter and St. Charles East! He is the right person for the job and will continue the tradition of excellence we have grown accustomed to at St. Charles East High School. I will continue to work in D303 until June 30, 2018, and then start my new job in Wheaton-Warrenville School District 200 on July 1st. I would like to thank all of the parents, students, administration, teachers and support staff who have worked with me as the Principal of STCE.

The Class of 2018 will graduate on Sunday, June 3 at 3:30 p.m. at the Northern Illinois Convocation Center. Please click on [this link](#) for more detailed information on parking, arrival, departure, etc. regarding graduation. I look forward to presiding over the graduation ceremony and feel like an honorary member of the Class of 2018. Congrats to an incredible group of men and women.

Due to the availability of Chromebooks for all high school students, the 2017-2018 second semester finals will be administered online and using Chromebooks. Teachers have been piloting online testing throughout the second semester in preparation for online semester finals.

We ask that all students bring their fully charged Chromebooks each day during finals week. Since this is our first attempt at online testing, we are also asking students to bring their charging cord to finals as well. If a student forgets to bring their Chromebook to finals, they will need to utilize the make-up exam time on Tuesday, June 5th or schedule a make-up exam time in the summer with the Assistant Principal for Instructional Programs.

Upon the completion of their finals on Tuesday, June 5th, faculty and staff will be collecting student Chromebooks and charging cords at the end of 5th period testing. The bus pick up for June 4th and June 5th have been moved back until 1:15p.m. to accommodate the collection of thousands of Chromebooks. If a student is done with finals before the 5th period final, they can return their Chromebook and charging cord to the LRC. In addition, information regarding what is required during the return process will be shared with students via email and announcements and for parents via email.

Seniors will follow a similar procedure during their last day of attendance on Thursday, May 31.

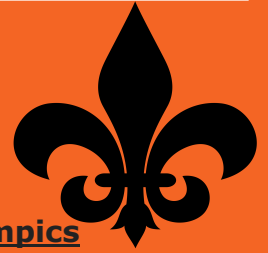
Please note that students who do not return their Chromebook and charging cord prior to Summer Break will be charged a replacement fee (\$250/\$22).

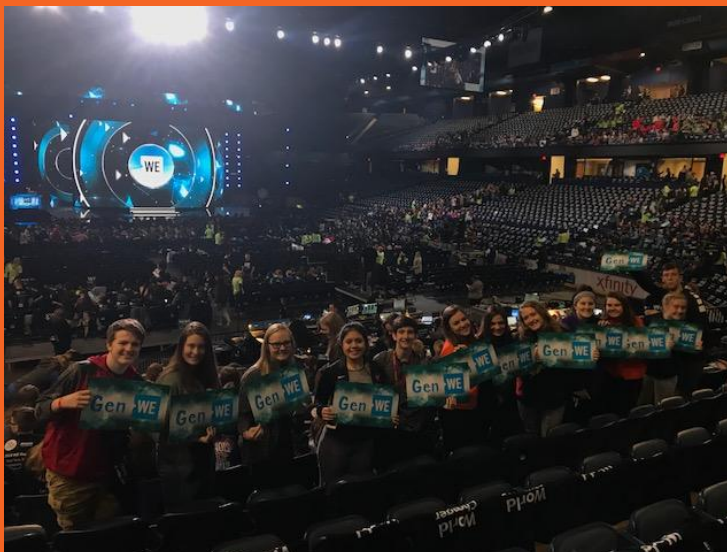

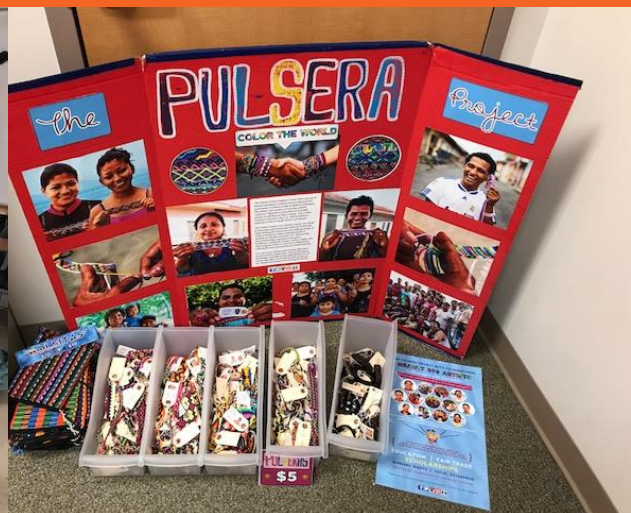

## **When the Question is the Answer...**

With the adoption of new social studies standards by the state of Illinois, District #303 has been working on developing new curriculum. The standards dictate that our curriculum focus equally on disciplinary concepts and inquiry skills, to enable students to become independent thinkers and lifelong learners. We are excited about the changes and have been working hard to get our classes rewritten and our own skills up to date. Here are a few highlights.

1. Most required social studies classes have been rewritten, and new options are available for freshmen. Freshmen can now choose between a Contemporary World Issues class or a World History and Geography class. Both of these will be new for next year and feature a more specific look at Geography.
2. New AP classes will also be available. Freshmen through seniors can enroll in our new AP World History course, and sophomores through seniors can enroll in an AP Seminar course. Our Seminars next year will focus on Conspiracy Theories: Fact or Fiction? Or Sports in Society.
3. We will start rewriting our elective courses this summer and will be developing new standard-level electives. Keep your eyes open for exciting new options for the 2019-2020 school year!

Besides writing new curriculum, social studies teachers will be participating in summer staff development to ensure we coach students through the inquiry process consistently. These changes will be in place in grades 6-12 starting next school year, and K-5 shortly after. We look forward to fostering your child's (and our!) curiosity next year!

Throughout the course, students work in teams to brainstorm, design, and develop their own product or service in attempt to be awarded seed money from a board of investors. The design of this course is similar to the ABC television show, "Shark Tank." Community entrepreneurs and business experts serve as volunteer coaches and mentors guiding student teams to success. At the final pitch night, student teams have the opportunity to earn actual funding to further develop their product or service and launch their business. Student teams who earn funding at the pitch event are expected to make a commitment to continue onto ACCEleratoredu, the second year of the program.

St. Charles Community Unit School District 303 is pleased to announce the Community Champions who will serve as liaisons between the school district and the community. Mayor Ray Rogina, Jim Di Ciaula, Chamber of Commerce President, Jenna Sawicki, Executive Director of the Downtown Partnership, and Laura Macklin-Purdy, Developing and Branding Manager of the Downtown Partnership have agreed to be part of the team as Community Champions.

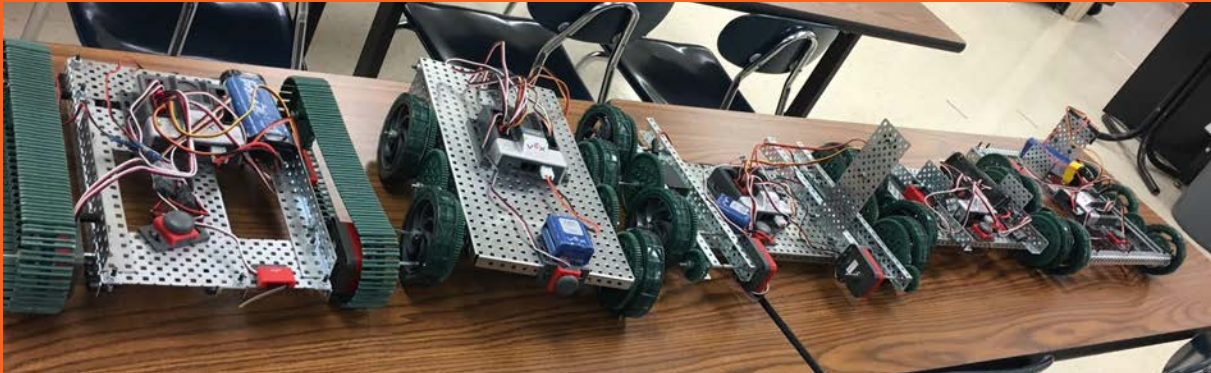

Project Lead the Way national recently notified East that 7 students qualified to receive the AP & PLTW recognition. To earn this student achievement, students must complete three courses in a pathway - one AP course; one PLTW course; and a third course, either AP or PLTW - and earn a qualifying score of 3 or higher on the AP Exam(s) and a score of Proficient 6 or higher on the PLTW End-of-Course (EoC) Assessment(s). This sequence can be completed over multiple years. Completing this qualification demonstrates to colleges and employers that the student is ready for advanced course work and interested in careers in this discipline.

Schools that bring together AP and PLTW courses in a meaningful way for students also earn recognition for their commitment to helping students get college and career ready in STEM fields.

### **Grade Weighting**

On May 14th, the school board will vote to recognize most Project Lead the Way (PLTW) courses with honors weighting. If approved, all courses will carry this weighting starting with the 2018/2019 school year. Changing this designation recognizes the importance of the PLTW national curriculum, high quality professional development, and the rigor of these project/problem based classes. Historically, math and science classes are taught in isolation but in the PLTW classroom, students get opportunities to demonstrate what they have learned and take the initiative for their own learning. This change to PLTW courses also provides equal footing to the students when competing against other surrounding PLTW programs for college admission.
