Munhall's *One Book, One School* Initiative



To conclude their school-wide reading initiative, more than 50 Munhall families enjoyed a picnic dinner and a reading of the final chapters of *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane*, by author Kate DiCamillo, on February 15.

Families brought sandwiches, hotdogs, and snacks to share. They also brought blankets and gathered around the activity center floor to eat, while talking and sharing their thoughts about the book. Tables were set up where families played trivia games, colored and participated in other activities related to Edward Tulane.

As second grade teacher, Mr. Bearrick, settled in to read the last chapters of the book, students moved closer to him and attentively listened to find out how Edward Tulane's story concluded. After the reading, families shared their experiences about reading at home as well as their thoughts about the book, engaging those who attended in a final book discussion.



"The family experience of reading and discussing the books together are precious memories and bond-building moments that none of us will ever forget," said Mr. Bearrick, who also shared his experiences as a parent reading novels every night to his children until they were older.



Munhall introduced their One Book, One School initiative on January 21 for the whole school to read *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane*, by Kate DiCamillo. The book follows the life of a china rabbit and his emotional journey of self-discovery and love.

With support from Munhall's PTO, each family received a copy of the book in English or in Spanish, if they preferred. Every week, families followed a schedule to read certain chapters at home. The chapters of the book were also pre-recorded by a Munhall or District staff member in English and Spanish for students to listen to and follow along at home.

Each Friday, staff members highlighted a particular theme of the book. On Trivia Tuesdays students who correctly answered questions about the book won prizes. Students engaged in classroom book discussions while practicing and learning new vocabulary.

During the picnic event, families also had an opportunity to make suggestions and vote on the next book for Munhall families to read.

EHS Wrestlers Win State Tournament

St. Charles East High School students and staff gathered after school to celebrate the outstanding accomplishments of the Fighting Saints for having three senior wrestlers make the podium at the 2019 IHSA Individual State Wrestling Tournament, which took place February 14-16 in Champaign.

Justin Benjamin was the State Champion, Justin Hull placed 2nd, and Tommy Schroeder, placed 3rd. Junior Peyton Schroeder, also qualified for state.



"They definitely earned it," said head coach, Jason Potter. "They spent uncountable hours training and, in the end, each one attained success. It was also a great experience for Peyton Schroeder as he will be back next year."

Staff members, coaches, and students congratulated the wrestlers over cake, posed for pictures, and shared stories about the tournament.

After qualifying for state four times throughout his wrestling career, and encountering challenges and injuries along the way, Justin Benjamin went undefeated during the tournament and won the state title. "He's a great example of our program. If you believe in it and train for it, even if it looks like you're nowhere near; if you keep on working, it's going to happen," said coach Potter.

"I feel like I'm at the peak of the mountain," said Justin Benjamin during the celebration. "I couldn't believe it and it still feels surreal."

Justin Hull made it to the finals, but not without challenge. He defeated two opponents who previously beat him during the regular season, and those victories helped him place 2nd at state. "His 3rd place finish as a junior and 2nd place as a senior puts him in the top ten in most decorated St. Charles Wrestlers," added coach Potter.

After losing a match, Tommy Schroeder won five matches in a row to make it to the third-place match. "He's extremely dangerous; if he gets focused he can pin anybody," said coach Potter. During the last match, he ended up beating a returning state finalist and finished 3rd at state.

Assistant Principal for Student Life, Lisa Dandre, also shared that because of their great accomplishment, the student wrestlers were going to be invited to a School Board meeting and to a City Council meeting.



Jarret Payton shares Anti-Bullying Message with WMS

Wredling Middle School 8th grade students welcomed Jarret Payton and his anti-bullying message on March 5. Throughout his presentation, Jarret shared personal stories about his famous dad Walter, along with inspirational tales about self-growth he experienced during his years as an athlete.

As he talked about his childhood and detailed the ways in which he learned how rewarding it is to give back to the community, he encouraged students to take small steps to make new friends by asking questions that uncover things they have in common. Personal stories he told students about his dad proved that Walter continues to be an inspiration to others not just as an athlete but as a person who served his community.

Students attentively listened and laughed as he recounted the story about how he met Michael Jordan, who also inspired him to work hard and have determination.

After his presentation students asked questions. One student asked about how to deal with negative comments on social media, as well as cyberbullying. He encouraged students to ignore those negative comments and, instead, focus on the positive side of things. "Make sure what you put out to the world is a representation of who you are as a person," Jarrett said. He also stressed the importance of surrounding themselves with kind and positive people, as they can shape who they want to be.

He left students with an inspiring message that focused on respect and kindness, being good digital citizens, and encouraged them to find their passion and pursue their dreams. "Opportunity: if there's something you want to do, start today and take advantage of the time you have today," he added.

Richmond Connects with Students from England

“We’ll say good afternoon and you say good morning,” instructed a student from England to Richmond 3rd grade students who took part in the annual Read Around the Planet celebration during NEA’s Read Across America Day on March 5. Students connected through a videoconference at 8:00 a.m. in St. Charles and 2:00 p.m. in England.

NEA’s Read Across America is an annual reading celebration on Dr. Seuss’ birthday that encourages students all around the country to read. Through the Read Around the Planet initiative, students are able to connect with classes in other parts of the world to share books, stories, plays, and other activities.

Science and Technology Integration teacher, Amy Dixon helped coordinate classes to make this experience possible for students. With her support, they prepared a short skit based on the book *Ada Twist, Scientist*, by Andrea Beaty, to share during their video conference. “This is a different way of doing a field trip when it’s not possible to get out of the classroom,” she added with a smile.



The connection began with Richmond students introducing themselves and the school. They shared facts about Richmond and their class and provided some historical facts about St. Charles and Illinois.

As part of their presentation, several students read the story while others acted the scenes. Students created a background, brought props and costumes, and recreated the story in its entirety. When it was their turn to lead the conversation, the 3rd-grade students from England, who were part of an ESL program,



shared historical facts and traditions from Romania. They showed maps and pictures, shared a short poem, which they then translated to English, and even talked about Transylvania and the many stories related to the region.

Students asked questions in order to learn more about each other’s schools and countries. Richmond students inquired about the English school day, what the houses were like, and also the kinds of sports and games they played.

The students from England were very curious about the weather and asked if it was snowing. They were very surprised to learn that Richmond students did not wear uniforms to school like they did. In addition, they asked about the Willis Tower, how old the Richmond students are, and what they wanted to be when they grow up. Both classes were also very curious about the different languages spoken in each country and encouraged each other to continue to learn more languages.

This unique and interactive experience allowed students to share their learning while granting them an opportunity to learn about a different country and its unique culture. Since 2011, Mrs. Dixon has helped other Richmond students connect with classes from Canada, Minnesota, New Jersey, and Texas.

“Through these types of connections, students get a chance to communicate and experience a different country without leaving the classroom,” said Mrs. Dixon.

If you would like to design a logo that will be used on promotional materials, please use the following criteria and include:

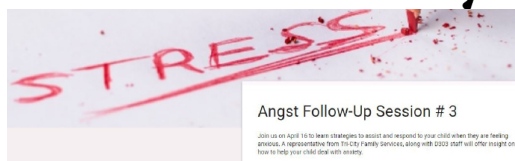

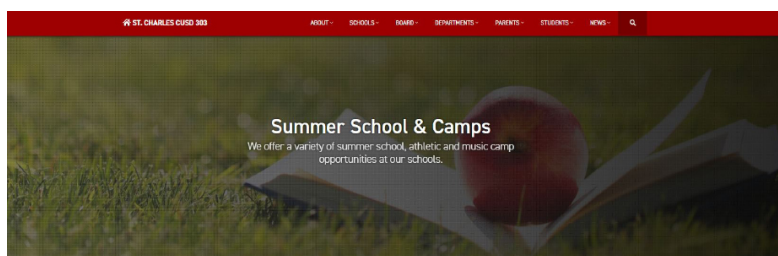

Since 2003 the St. Charles Education Foundation annually awards scholarships to two graduating seniors at each of the two high schools, St. Charles East and St. Charles North.
