
Lose the fear of "late"


- Children are developmentally ready to read at times
- - ent

- Accentuate the positive don't let your child think you are disappointed in their reading journey
- Don't try to be the teacher focus on developing a love of reading and books. Don't focus on the "level"
- Point out your mistakes when reading and normalize them
- Make reading social talk about books
- Comprehension is key there is more to reading than just decoding



























Independent Reader


Keep them reading!

- Find a series familiarity of characters, storylines, and patterns
- Don't forget picture books they aren't baby books
- Allow for familiar and comfort books rereading a familiar text is great for fluency
- Audiobooks allow for deeper thinking about the book taking out the decoding
- Read together read aloud and independently but together
- Talk about your own reading life what you're reading and why
- Keep books with you like you would your phone




Trust your reader!




- This is the time children really figure out their reading identities
- Allow for independence suggest and provide options, but don't insist on any one title
- Let them read for fun
- Keep reading aloud, individually or as a family
- Use the Internet help your child reach out their favorite author or find online fan communities
- Treat reading as its own reward, not a chore to complete









Exploring the real world


- Before you ban the book, have a conversation
- Use reviews to guide you Goodreads or Common Sense Media
- Acknowledge all reading without condescension websites, comics, magazines, fanfiction, etc.
- Don't worry if they take a reading "break"
- Let your child have access to your own bookshelf
- Keep talking about reading (theirs and yours)
- Read YA yourself!

Creating your own podcasts

- First, Learn About Podcasting
- Then, Plan Your Podcast
 - Choose a topic
 - Plan the story research, script, draft
 - Brainstorm sounds
- Finally, Produce your Podcast
 - Practice Recording & Interviewing
 - Record
 - Edit/Produce
 - Upload to a host
