

Learning during Anderson After-School Clubs

Learning does not stop for Anderson Elementary students after school is dismissed. On Thursdays, students from Kindergarten through 5th grade participate in after-school clubs and activities organized by ELL teacher, Annie Marinacci. While some activities are focused on fun, others provide students with some additional help with projects and assignments. All learning opportunities enhance collaboration between students.

The STREAM lab at Anderson is a place where students work on coding projects and robotics challenges. “Makey Makey” circuits enable students to experiment with different conductive and nonconductive materials that make music.

Kindergarten teacher and yoga expert, Mrs. Peterson, teaches students how to connect with their bodies and minds during yoga sessions. Each week students focus on a different area such as breathing and relaxation techniques, peace and quiet, improving flexibility and building strength. In addition, they learn about different types of yoga practices in other countries.

This is a great place for art club members to make slime using glue, baking soda, contact solution, and shaving cream and learn about different coloring techniques such as combining shaving cream and food coloring.

Other clubs feature indoor sports that teach students problem-solving techniques with card games and dice, while the theater and drama club help students interact with each other through a variety of self-expression.



Lincoln Elementary's 90th Anniversary Celebration



Community members, students, staff and parents celebrated Lincoln Elementary's 90th anniversary on March 21.

Special guests included alumni Mary Agnes Fisher, Joy Kacacek, Ray Kobald, and Viola Nelson. Mayor Rogina read a proclamation honoring the anniversary event that was also attended by Superintendent Dr. Jason Pearson, School Board President Kathy Hewell and School Board member Carolyn Waibel.

Lincoln Principal, Michelle Woodring highlighted activities in which students have been involved during

the school year, emphasizing student growth in the areas of reading, writing, and critical-thinking skills. As part of the ceremony, students delighted everyone by singing a verse from the old East Side School song.

St. Charles resident and Lincoln Elementary School Alumnus, Ray Kobald, spoke about his experiences being a student at Lincoln. He showed a picture from when he was in 5th grade and chuckled as he compared it to a current one. As a sculptor, he guided students through the process of building sculptures. He showed several pictures of some of his most well-known sculptures throughout St. Charles as students quickly recognized many of them, such as the Star Gazer and the Nice Pear.

As a culmination, President Abraham Lincoln and Mary Todd Lincoln made a special appearance. Students attentively listened to the stories the president shared about his childhood, and were amazed by how different his childhood was compared to theirs. Mr. Lincoln said he was honored to have a school named after him. He reflected on the importance of education and encouraged students to continue to learn.

When he opened the floor up to questions, students were most interested in whether or not he had a treehouse, if the characters in the book were real, and what his favorite room in the treehouse was.

Students laughed at his stories about his friend and colleague Terry, who illustrates the books and also appears as a character in the series, as well as other characters Mrs. Know It All and Mr. Big Nose. They laughed with his suggestions and were amazed by the infinite adventures that could be experienced in the ever-growing treehouse, such as toasting marshmallows in the room with the volcano, flying airplanes in the flying room, and spending time in the boxing elephant room.



He showed students pictures of different trees and treehouses from around the world, and guided them through the process to build a treehouse, all the while encouraging them to be creative and original with their own ideas.

Mrs. Michelle Poelster’s 3rd-grade class presented their guest with their own unique drawings of treehouses complete with rooms, pools and roller coasters. “In case you run out of ideas for the rooms for the next treehouse book,” joked Mrs. Hubbard.



Bell-Graham Poetry Slam

Bell-Graham Elementary School second grade students in Mrs. Robinson's class concluded their poetry unit with a Poetry Slam event on March 19 and March 21. Students dressed in black, which is customary for a poetry slam, confidently read the poems they had written about their hobbies, pets, favorite season, and even love.

For several weeks, students studied poetry, including rhyme, and rhythm while reading poems, as well as vocabulary used to write their own poems. Mrs. Robinson encouraged students to focus on writing about a topic about which they were passionate, or about something that interested them.

As they practiced and revised their poems, they made sure to include essential elements and adhere to the characteristics of poems, whether it was a conversation poem, a story poem (recounting a specific moment), or a riddle poem (revealing hints about the subject directly to the reader).

On the day of the event, students prepared an area of the classroom to serve as the stage and arranged the classroom so the audience could better appreciate their poems. Mrs. Robinson explained the appropriate etiquette when attending a poetry slam, such as snapping their fingers instead of clapping to show support and to listen with an open mind.

Each student had an opportunity to share their poem, and in the end, congratulated each other on their writing and creativity, and the unique style in which they presented their poem.

St. Charles North High School Educators Rising members honored teachers who have positively impacted their lives during the annual Teacher Appreciation Social on March 19. The Educators Rising club cultivates highly skilled educators by guiding young people on a path to becoming accomplished teachers, beginning in high school and extending through college and into the profession.

If you would like to design a logo that will be used on promotional materials, please use the following criteria and include:


