East Students Partner with Local Business for the 1st Sundae Showdown



he competition was equal parts sweet and minty on December 9 as St. Charles East students in the Marketing and Advertising II class faced off during the first Sundae Showdown at Kimmer's Ice Cream in St. Charles.

Prior to deciding which flavors to choose for their sundaes, students surveyed their school community to figure out which ice cream flavors were the most popular as well as the best toppings, and additional seasonal ingredients for the desserts. After analyzing their survey results, the teams



worked closely with the staff from Kimmer's to figure out the best combinations of ice cream and toppings for the sundaes. As part of their planning process, students also visited Kimmer's for a tasting and to see the sundaes being made.

Reindeer Tracks started with an oreo cookie base, a scoop of delicious seasonal peppermint ice cream drizzled with hot fudge and marshmallow fluff. And, to top it off, whipped cream and crushed graham crackers for that fall and winter blend. The other team's sundae, Hint of Mint, started with a big scoop of the fan-favorite mint chocolate chip ice cream, drizzled with hot fudge, whipped cream, and topped off with crushed Oreos and a tasty cherry on top.



Over 100 sundaes were sold during the showdown, a record-breaking sale of sundaes for Kimmer's. In the end, Reindeer Tracks was named the winning sundae, with 59 sold. "Students learned about food insecurity as part of their social studies curriculum and that made them more excited to organize this food drive," expressed Mrs. Thomas. Through this project, students learn about

the importance of giving back to the community as they develop leadership and collaboration skills.

To help students better understand how



their donations support needy families in our communities, Molly Speckman, Development Officer, Peer to Peer & Cause Marketing from the Northern Illinois Food Bank, visited Davis. She shared information about the work they do at the food bank and how important volunteers are as they check and sort all the food and help with distribution. She shared that students can volunteer with their parents at the food bank, if they are 8 years old or older.

On December 15, students counted the cans of soup, from the ever-so-popular chicken noodle soup to veggie, tomato, and even ravioli soup. Together, they collected almost 300 cans of soup for families in need.

"I know the partnership with Student Council, Fuel Up, and the St. Charles community has been one that students have valued and this project will be a reminder for many of our students as they continue to learn the importance of giving back to the community," said Mrs. Thomas.

School Year



The following is the plan for how District 303 will manage emergency days for the 2021-2022 school year.

- The School Board has approved an e-learning plan that gives the District the option to offer remote learning in place of emergency days
- If we experience inclement weather, the first three days will be "snow days" that will be made up at the end of the school year on May 25, 26, and 27 as needed
- Subsequent emergency days will be remote days so the last attendance day will still be before Memorial Day
- If there is a long stretch of inclement weather (blizzard, polar vortex, etc.), we may split the
 days into "snow days" and e-learning days so as to not have too many non-attendance
 days in a row
- Families will be notified via Parent Link when there is a closure due to inclement weather
- Information about any closures will also be posted on the district website, on social media, and broadcast on Chicago TV and radio stations

Job Shadow Opportunities for High School Students

his semester, high school students were able to visit City Hall, the St. Charles Fire Department, and the St. Charles Police Department as part of the career pathway job shadow program offered by the City of St. Charles. The program is tailored to students interested in exploring careers in municipal government.

St. Charles North Junior, Alec Mandziara, shadowed Assistant Fire Chief Tony Cavallo to experience a day in the life of a firefighter. He toured the St. Charles Fire Department, learned about the education, training, and certifications required, and asked questions about the different career opportunities available. Alec even had the opportunity to ride along with Mr. Cavallo and see other staff from the Fire Department assist with a call. On December 8, Alec also shadowed Deputy Chief Chuck Pierce to learn more about the duties and responsibilities of police officers.

High school students Lilly Hale and Aaron Naugle also visited the St. Charles Police Department and shadowed Crime Prevention Officer Meghan Kramer. As they toured the Police Department, they asked questions about her training, why she decided to go into law enforcement, and even got to meet K-9 Saint and comfort dog Charlie.

"Through our partnership with the City of St. Charles we can continue to offer our students many more learning opportunities," expressed John Peters, Assistant Principal for College and Career Readiness at St. Charles North.

Many parents commented how much they loved the performances and noted how much their children had improved since they started, attributing much of that to Mrs. Lydigsen, Director of Bands, and her love for band. One Munhall parent cheerfully expressed how they were incredibly delighted to have had the opportunity to see their daughter not only perform but also give the introduction for her instrument so eloquently and calmly.

"It was so wonderful to see the band students back on the stage performing for a live audience," said Mrs. Lydigsen. "I am overwhelmed with a sense of pride for these students who have shown such resilience, dedication, and enthusiasm. I love being a part of their musical journey and guiding them through the process of becoming confident young musicians," she added.



All fifth grade students in the district are able to join the beginning band program. Students meet for small group lessons once per week throughout the school year and also before school to work as a full band ensemble. The group typically performs two big concerts per year at St. Charles East High School and performs the National Anthem at the Kane County Cougars game in the spring. Students are able to choose an instrument to play, whether it be the oboe, the flute, the clarinet, the trumpet, the trombone, and even the tuba.

Test to Stay Program in District 303

District 303, in collaboration with SHIELD testing, has implemented a test to stay program for students in our district who have not received the COVID-19 vaccine. Participation in the program may decrease the need for students to quarantine if they have been in close contact with an individual who has tested positive for COVID-19. While the district has made it possible for students to maintain 3 feet of distance in classrooms and 6 feet in the cafeterias, students may be closer than that while riding the bus, which may result in them being quarantined. Students who are enrolled in SHIELD testing prior to possible exposure to COVID-19 or establishing close contact can remain in school as long as they have negative tests and are symptom free on days 1, 3, 5, and 7 after exposure. In the coming years, the essay contest will become a scholarship program where students will receive scholarship money for four years to use towards tuition, books, and any expenses related to their college education.





Submit to the Community Backpack

District 303 distributes information electronically from non-profit organizations, intergovernmental agencies and business partners for which it grants approval. Information can be posted on this Community Backpack webpage throughout the school year. Those wishing to submit information to be posted must do so electronically by emailing a completed CB Flyer Request Form and a PDF of the requested posting to the District 303 Administration Center, in care of Janelle Magana at least ten days in advance of the desired posting date. Additionally, when submitting the first posting request of the school year, a completed

<u>Certificate of Not-For-Profit Status Form</u> must also be completed and submitted with a copy of the groups 501(c)3 certificate.

Prior to submitting, please <u>read details</u> <u>regarding our distribution guidelines</u>. The decision to post is at the discretion of District 303 administrators, based on these guidelines.
